6.19 GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

It shall be the policy of the Board to acknowledge each student's successful completion of the instructional program appropriate to the achievement of District goals and objectives as well as personal proficiency by the awarding of a diploma at appropriate graduation ceremonies.

High School Diplomas and Commencement

The Board shall award a high school diploma to every student enrolled in this District who meets the requirements of graduation established by this Board, the State Board of Education, and the Ohio Revised Code, including the passage of all state mandated proficiency or graduation tests and/or state mandated graduation pathway requirements.

Each diploma shall be signed by the President and Treasurer of the Board, the Superintendent, and the Principal of the High School and shall bear the date of its issuance.

Students participating in graduation ceremonies must meet the following requirements:

- 1. Successful completion of all requirements contained in the Ohio Revised Code and set by the State Board of Education, and this Board of Education.
- 2. Students graduating early must have filed the required application papers.
- 3. All financial obligations to the high school or Board of Education must be paid.
- 4. All disciplinary obligations must be satisfactorily completed.
- 5. Students participating in the ceremony must wear the prescribed cap and gown.
- 6. Students eligible to participate in the graduation ceremony will exhibit decorum that will not be disruptive or bring undue attention to themselves.

Students whose decorum is disruptive or brings undue attention to themselves will not be awarded their diploma at the commencement exercises. They will be required to attend school for the duration of the regular school year. Should their attendance be acceptable, they shall receive their diploma at the close of the last day of the regular school year.

Requirements to Earn a High School Diploma

The requirements for participation in commencement and receiving a diploma shall include:

Curriculum Requirements

Twenty (20) units in grades 9-12 to be distributed as follows:

- 1. English language arts, four units;
- 2. Health, one-half unit, which shall include instruction in nutrition and the benefits of nutritious foods and physical activity for overall health;
- 3. Mathematics, four units, which shall include one unit of Algebra II or its equivalent;
 - a. Algebra II, its equivalent, or advanced computer science, one unit.

Students are advised some institutions of higher education require Algebra II, or equivalent, for purposes of college admission. Parents must complete a form

acknowledging this if the student will take advanced computer science in lieu of Algebra II, or its equivalent.

This requirement is not applicable for students pursuing a career-technical instructional track, who may take an approved career-based mathematics course as an alternative.

- b. As set forth below, one unit of mathematics may be satisfied by taking one-half unit of financial literacy and one-half unit of mathematics (excluding Algebra II, its equivalent, or any course for which the state requires and end-of-course exam). However, students who take advanced computer science in lieu of Algebra II shall not be permitted to satisfy any mathematics unit by completing one-half unit of financial literacy and instead must satisfy that requirement as an elective unit.
- 4. Physical education, one-half unit;
 - 5. Science, three units, which shall include the following:
 - a. Physical sciences, one unit;
 - b. Biology, one unit;
 - c. Advanced study in one or more of the following sciences, one unit:
 - i. Chemistry, physics, or other physical science;
 - ii. Advanced biology or other life science.
 - iii. Astronomy, physical geology, or other earth or space science;
 - iv. Computer science.
- 6. History and government, one unit, which shall include both of the following:
 - a. American history, one-half unit;
 - b. American government, one-half unit;
- 7. Social studies, two units, which shall include the following:
 - a. World history and civilizations, one-half unit (eff. Class of 2021 and beyond).
 - b. Instruction on economics and financial literacy which shall be incorporated into at least one credit of the social studies curriculum (eff. Class of 2014 through 2025).
- 8. Fine arts, one unit (taken between 7th and 12th grade);
- Five units consisting of one of any combination of foreign language, fine arts, business, career-technical education, family and consumer sciences, technology, agricultural education, or English language arts, mathematics, science, or social studies not otherwise required;
- 10. Financial literacy, one-half unit

This requirement applies only for students entering ninth grade after July 1, 2022 (Class of 2026 and beyond). It may be satisfied as an elective credit taken as part of the five (5) required units set forth above or taken in-lieu of one-half credit of mathematics (excluding Algebra II or the equivalent, or any course for which the state requires an end-of-course exam).

Units earned in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies that are delivered through integrated academic and career-technical instruction are eligible to meet graduation requirements.

Advanced student work completed prior to the ninth grade may be applied toward graduation requirements if the advanced work was taught by a teacher who possessed a license valid for teaching high school and designated by the Board of Education as meeting the high school Curriculum Requirements.

In addition to satisfying the above Curriculum Requirements, students must also complete certain Additional Requirements to be eligible for graduation. These requirements differ based upon the student's year of graduation.

Additional Requirements

In addition to completing the Curriculum Requirements, students must achieve both of the following to qualify for graduation:

1. Attain a competency score (as determined by the State Board of Education) on the Algebra I and English Language Arts II end-of-course examinations.

Students who take the required assessments more than once without passing, and have received remedial supports may demonstrate the required competency by completing the alternative options established by Ohio law and the regulations of the State Board of Education.

2. Earn at least two diploma seals in accordance with the requirements of the State Board of Education.

At least one of the required seals must be defined by the State Board of Education.

The Superintendent, or designee, shall develop guidelines for at least one (1) of the additional seals as permitted by the Ohio Revised Code and the regulations of the State Board of Education.

Earned diploma seals shall be attached to a student's diploma and transcript. The Board shall recognize any locally determined seals earned by a student in another school district.

Any required deficiencies must be completed prior to graduation. Graduation requirements are minimum requirements. It is the responsibility of the student to see that requirements for graduation are met. The high school makes every effort to keep current records and to keep students and parents informed about the status of progress toward completing the work

necessary to meet these requirements. However, it is up to the student to make sure that he or she is acquainted with the necessary requirements to meet this goal.

Graduation Plans

The Superintendent, or designee, shall develop a graduation plan for each student enrolled in grades nine through twelve in the District. The graduation plan shall address the student's academic pathway to meet the curriculum requirements specified by the Board and satisfy the graduation conditions under state law.

The graduation plan shall be developed jointly by the student, the student's parent, guardian, or custodian, and the District and updated each school year in which the student is enrolled in the District's schools, until the student qualifies for a high school diploma. A student's graduation plan shall supplement the District's existing policy on career advising.

The Board shall use the individualized education program developed for a student in lieu of developing a graduation plan under this policy if the individualized education program contains academic goals substantively similar to a graduation plan.

Identifying At-Risk Students

A student's lack of progress in meeting the terms of his/her graduation plan shall be a criterion for identifying at-risk students and a procedure for identifying at-risk students under this policy. To ensure all students are on track to satisfy the terms of their graduation plans, the Superintendent, or designee, shall:

- A. Develop additional criteria for identifying at-risk students, including, a student's lack of adequate progress in meeting the terms of his/her graduation plan, and other factors, such as if a student has issues regarding excessive absences or misconduct.
- B. Develop procedures for identifying at-risk students, including a method for determining if a student is not making adequate progress in meeting the terms of his/her graduation plan, and which allow for a student to be identified as at risk in each of grades nine through twelve.
- C. Provide written notification to an at-risk student's parent, guardian, or custodian in each year in which the student has been identified as at-risk, which includes:
 - 1. A statement that the student is at risk of not qualifying for a high school diploma;
 - 2. A description of the Board's curriculum requirements, or the student's individualized education program, and, as appropriate, the graduation conditions prescribed under state law;
 - 3. A description of any additional instructional or support services available to the atrisk student.
- D. Assist at-risk students with additional instructional or support services to help the students qualify for a high school diploma.

Notification of Core Curriculum

The parent, guardian, or custodian of each student enrolled in a high school operated by the Board or enrolled in the joint vocational school to which the District belongs shall be notified by letter, via the annual report, or by other means determined by the Superintendent, or designee, of the requirements of the Ohio core curriculum and that one consequence of not completing that curriculum is ineligibility to enroll in most state universities in Ohio without further coursework.

Honors Diploma

Honors diplomas shall be granted in accordance with Ohio law.

Veterans' Diploma

The Board may grant a diploma to a veteran of World War II, the Korean Conflict, or the Vietnam Conflict in accordance with Ohio law.

The Board may also grant a high school diploma to any woman who left high school in any state during World War II, the Korean conflict, or the Vietnam Conflict to support her family or the war effort in accordance with Ohio law.

Alternative Conditions for Graduation

Students not meeting the traditional requirements may be eligible for graduation in accordance with Ohio law and the requirements set by the State Board of Education.

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
